## Proposed policy for prerequisites in upper-level courses

## Background

According to the UGA Bulletin (<u>https://bulletin.uga.edu/bulletin/acad/courses.html#Numbers</u>): "Courses numbered from 1000 to 2999 are considered lower-level courses. Courses numbered 3000 to 4999 are considered upper-level courses. Courses numbered 5000 to 5999 are considered professional-level courses. Courses numbered 6000 and above are considered graduate-level courses."

The UGA curriculum committee reads and approves all courses proposed, revised, or deleted at UGA. Numerous upper-level courses are proposed that do not require prerequisites. Common questions from the committee: 1) why does this upper-level course not have prerequisites? 2) why is this course offered at the 3000-5000 level instead of the 1000-2000 level since it does not have prerequisites? The Registrar's Office compiled a spreadsheet comparing prerequisite policies from 15 comparators and nine aspirational institutions. After reviewing this spreadsheet, a subcommittee of the University Curriculum Committee met to discuss whether a prerequisite policy was needed at UGA.

## **Proposed Policy**

Prerequisites should normally be required for upper-level (3000-4000) and professional-level (5000) courses. For 3000-5000 level courses with no prerequisite listed, the minimum skills, experience, and/or competencies expected for students to enroll in the course should be specified. Permission of Department (POD) status for courses may be used in lieu of specific course prerequisites to help ensure that such informal prerequisites are met.

## Rationale

Course prerequisites help ensure students are adequately prepared for the course content and have the foundational knowledge needed. This type of preparatory work helps ensure students' success and sequences their learning. Prerequisites also eliminate the need for instructors to reduce the rigor of the content to accommodate students without the necessary background.

The proposed policy would help expedite the course review and approval process, better inform students interested in taking a particular course, and ensure that instructors can teach the course content at the appropriate level.
