

Students seeking a minor in Latin American & Caribbean Studies must complete eighteen (18) hours as follows: (A) LACS 1000; (B) a Latin American History course (HIST 2221 or HIST 2222); (C) an advanced course in one language from the region (SPAN, PORT, or FREN 3010); (D) three LAC courses representing two or more of the three areas of Latin American & Caribbean Studies, which include: Social Sciences; Humanities, Art, and Music; and Environmental Science, Policy, and Historical Preservation. Twelve (12) credits must be in upper division courses (above the 3000 level). Students would be expected to fulfill any course prerequisite requirements as directed.

Students would be subject to the residency requirements of the university for completion of the Bachelor's degree.

In order to receive credit toward the minor, the student would have to earn a grade of "C" or better in each course.

Required course: LACS 1000: Introduction to Latin American & Caribbean Studies.
