Dear Dean Dorsey,

Enclosed you will find a proposal from the Hugh Hodgson School of Music to create an undergraduate minor in Jazz Music, available to non-music majors. This proposal arises after considerable thought and attention from our jazz area faculty and has been approved by our Undergraduate Committee and faculty as a whole. We forward it to you for the college's consideration before being sent to the university for approval.

There is broad and significant student interest throughout the university for additional studies in jazz. In recent years we have expanded from one jazz band to two and have seen strong and consistent enrollment in courses in improvisation and in jazz combos. The ability to improvise and collaborate with other musicians in the integrated, creative context of jazz is among the most important skills required of musicians today. Though this minor is not available to music majors (following university policy), we are quite certain it will draw strong enrollment from across campus.

The content of the minor, drawn from ensembles, theory, improvisation, history, and related electives provides a strong context for this study. I recommend this as a helpful step in bringing the creative arts to our student body.

# Hugh Hodgson School of Music Program of Study Minor in Jazz Music

## **GENERAL GUIDELINES:**

- This minor is only available to non-Music Majors.
- Jazz Music minors must be admitted to the program by auditioning with the Director of the Jazz Studies Program.
- A grade of "C" or higher must be maintained for all courses in the minor.
- Jazz Music minors must complete a minimum of 15 semester hours of coursework with at least nine hours of upper-division coursework (3000-level or higher). Only three hours may be transferred in from another institution.
- Courses taken to satisfy University Core Areas I-V may not be counted as coursework in the minor.
- Courses taken in University Core Area VI may be counted as coursework in the minor.
