The Area of Emphasis in Eighteenth-Century Literature focuses on British and American literature written during the eighteenth century.

### 1. Why is this area of emphasis being proposed for termination?

The department is replacing the Area of Emphasis in Eighteenth-Century Literature with a new, related Area of Emphasis in Literatures of Empire. Due to staffing changes, the department is no longer able to offer a sufficient number of classes in the Area of Emphasis in Eighteenth-Century Literature. The new, related, more expansive Area of Emphasis in Literatures of Empire better matches current student interest and current faculty availability.

### 2. What will be done to ensure that termination of the area of emphasis does not weaken the major(s) under which it is offered?

The department is proposing a new, related Area of Emphasis in Literatures of Empire, which will accommodate students who would have pursued the Area of Emphasis in Eighteenth-Century Literature.

### 3. How will faculty and staff be notified of the termination? Will termination of the area of emphasis have any impact on the faculty and staff offering the area of emphasis?

Faculty and staff have already been notified. This change was approved unanimously by the English Department. Terminating the Area of Emphasis in Eighteenth-Century Literature will have no impact on faculty or staff.

### 4. How will students be notified of the termination? How will students currently in the area of emphasis be advised to complete the requirements?

Currently, no students are enrolled in this Area of Emphasis. Should any be enrolled at the time of termination, the English undergraduate office will contact any affected students individually. Students will be advised to shift over to the new, related Area of Emphasis in Literatures of Empire.

At the time that this Area of Emphasis was created, many Linguistics faculty were members of the English department. Since that time, Linguistics has become its own separate department, so Linguistics classes are no longer offered by the English department, and the Area of Emphasis coursework is no longer supported.

### 2. What will be done to ensure that termination of the area of emphasis does not weaken the major(s) under which it is offered?

Students interested in linguistics and language are well served by the many classes offered by the Linguistics department.

Faculty and staff have already been notified. This change was approved unanimously by the English Department. Terminating the Area of Emphasis in English Language Studies will have no impact on faculty or staff.

Due to retirements and staffing changes, the English department no longer offers classes in Humanities Computing. The department does still offer classes in the other subjects included in this Area of Emphasis, most of which will now be included in two new, related Areas of Emphasis: the Area of Emphasis in Professional Writing and the Area of Emphasis in Literature and Media. The new Areas of Emphasis better match student interest and current faculty availability.

### 2. What will be done to ensure that termination of the area of emphasis does not weaken the major(s) under which it is offered?

The department is proposing two new related Areas of Emphasis, in Professional Writing and Literature and Media, respectively. These Areas of Emphasis will accommodate students who would have pursued the Area of Emphasis in Humanities Computing.

### 3. How will faculty and staff be notified of the termination? Will termination of the area of emphasis have any impact on the faculty and staff offering the area of emphasis?

Faculty and staff have already been notified. This change was approved unanimously by the English Department. Terminating the Area of Emphasis in Humanities Computing will have no impact on faculty or staff.

Only one student is currently enrolled in this Area of Emphasis. The English undergraduate office will contact the student individually.
