## 7. Program Description:

Early cultures developed sophisticated art and architecture, language, philosophy, religion, rituals, and social and political structures independently, yet often in contact with other cultures. This interdisciplinary minor explores the diverse cultures of Classical antiquity in relation to other early cultures, ancient and more recent, for exploration of points of intersection and divergence. The minor seeks to position the Classical Mediterranean in a global historical and multidisciplinary context. It contextualizes the ways that cultures throughout the world have embraced, rejected, challenged, and adapted the legacy of Classical thought, letters, music, art, and architecture. The geographic areas for comparative study include Asia (East and West) and the Pacific Islands, Australia and Oceania, Africa, Europe, and the Americas.
