The attached policy concerning Implementation of the Cultural Diversity Requirement has been approved and is provided for your information. The University Curriculum Committee Subcommittee on Cultural Diversity has reviewed the Cultural Diversity Implementation plan for your college based on the new policy. The subcommittee would like you to provide a list of courses for the college that will satisfy the Cultural Diversity Requirement.

The subcommittee would like to point out that the policy states that a student will only have to satisfy the requirement once, unless it is part of program requirements for the major. Because the implementation plan for your college differs by department, there should be a mechanism in place for students who may change departments.

PROCEDURES FOR ESTABLISHING OR CHANGING IMPLEMENTATION PLANS FOR THE CULTURAL DIVERSITY REQUIREMENT

Academic Affairs Policy Statement No. 11

1. Policy (as adopted by the University Council on June 5, 1997)

In order to further enrich the educational experience of the University of Georgia and to ensure that our graduates acquire the understanding and respect for cultural differences necessary for an enlightened citizenry, all undergraduate students will be required to study cultural diversity within a domestic or global context before graduation. This requirement may be completed by curricular or extracurricular experiences. The curricular requirement option may include study abroad, supported learning experiences, infusion of content across courses, or one course or a series of courses, so long as the particular approach meets the approval of the student's college or school. The extra-curricular option may be fulfilled with a community service program or related project approved by the individual school or college. Having once satisfied this requirement, the student will not have to fulfill it again unless it is part of program requirements for his or her major. Both the curricular and extra-curricular options will be developed or revisited by each school or college in consultation with students from that particular school or college.

The cultural diversity requirement should enable students to develop their understanding of issues of race, religion, ethnicity, gender, and class, not only within the cultures they are studying, but also as applied to their own cultures. Thus faculty teaching courses or supervising extracurricular experiences should help students process their experiences and insights by application to the contemporary cultures in which they live.

Each school and college is charged with determining what courses and/or experiences of domestic or global study fulfill the curricular option, and what activities fulfill the extracurricular option. Units will design the requirement so that there is not an increase in hours beyond the approved limit. Each school and college will be responsible for monitoring the compliance of its students to the requirement, beginning in Fall of 1998.

The University will not mandate a cultural diversity requirement for students in post baccalaureate programs. However, each school or college with a post baccalaureate program is encouraged, using its own procedures, to evaluate the adequacy of those programs with respect to diversity content and issues and to make modifications where necessary.

2. Learning Outcomes for University-wide Cultural Diversity Requirement

Graduates should have developed an awareness of how historical events and longstanding customs relating to race, religion, ethnicity, gender, and class have influenced contemporary political, social, and economic issues of society.

Graduates should appreciate that a person's race, religion, ethnicity, gender, and class may affect how he or she perceives and assimilates information presented in a variety of media forms.

Graduates should be sensitive to how society's perspectives on race, religion, ethnicity, gender, and class are influenced by the portrayal of persons and events in a variety of media forms.

3. Process

a. Implementation Plans

Using the learning outcomes stated above, each school and college will submit an implementation plan detailing how students will satisfy the Cultural Diversity Requirement. Proposals to establish or change an implementation plan should be based on the learning outcomes and conform to the following guidelines:

- 1. When courses are used to satisfy the requirement, a list of the specific courses must be included in the implementation plan.
- 2. When extracurricular activities are used to satisfy the requirement, students will be required to provide a substantive written document reflecting on how their experiences fulfill the learning outcomes. This document must be reviewed and passed as satisfactory by the Cultural Diversity Certification Officer for the unit (see b), or by an appropriate faculty member designated by the Certification Officer. Examples of extracurricular activities include study abroad, internships, or work experiences (paid or volunteer).
- b. Each School/College will designate a person who will function as a Cultural Diversity Certification Officer and will have responsibility of certifying that students have satisfied the requirement prior to graduation.
- c. Proposals to establish or change implementation plans should be submitted by the School/College to the Office of the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost for consideration by the University Curriculum Committee. The proposal will be sent to the Full University Curriculum Committee for information and reviewed by a standing subcommittee of the University Curriculum Committee. The subcommittee will have the authority to approve proposals on behalf of the Full University Curriculum Committee. However, any issues unresolved by the subcommittee will be reviewed by the Full University Curriculum Committee. The subcommittee will evaluate the proposal to assure that it conforms with this policy and is consistent with Board of Regents policy.
- d. Affirmative recommendations of the University Curriculum Committee will be forwarded to the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost for final review.
- e. All approved new or revised implementation plans will become effective subsequent to appearing in the online University of Georgia *Bulletin*.

Cultural Diversity Requirement

- 1. First and foremost, the baccalaureate for Landscape Architecture (B.L.A.) is a <u>five-year</u> required course of study making it much more likely that the student will have considerable exposure to cultural diversity, as it is a "professional" degree in a licensed profession. It is the only undergraduate degree offered by the School.
- 2. The following courses are required and each have cultural segments which when added to other required courses result in good exposure to cultural diversity:
 - a. LAND 3530 <u>Planning and Design</u> (2 hrs.) Approaches to planning and design in Landscape Architecture. The relationships between applied theories and methods and the environmental, social, and cultural context of projects.
 - b. LAND 3540 <u>Dwelling and Community</u> (2 hrs.) Concepts and theories of residential and neighborhood form.
 - c. LAND 4550 Region, Site and Place (2 hrs.) Physical and cultural determinants of landscape character from regional to site specific scales.
- 3. The following <u>required courses</u> contain a much more comprehensive exposure to cultural diversity:
 - a. EDES 1500 <u>Design and the Environment</u> (3 hrs.) Meets full Environmental Ethics Requirement and deals with integrating ecological, social, and cultural values.
 - b. EDES 2510 <u>History of the Built Environment I (3 hrs.</u>) Ancient through Renaissance periods, design of the built environment relative to socio-cultural, technological, aesthetic, and environmental factors.
 - c. EDES 2520 History of the Built Environment II (3 hrs.) 1600 A.D. to the present.
 - d. EDES 4650/6650 City Planning (2 hrs.) Community goals and objectives.
- 4. There are a large number of other courses which have considerable "cultural" content or which, depending on the project selected could have (and often do). All students complete the program with a comprehensive design project, which must take all primary factors into consideration (environmental, social, cultural, economic, etc.) LAND 4720.
- 5. All students are <u>required</u> to do an internship during the summer between their 4th and 5th years. These internships are in professional design practices or in public agencies. LAND 4720 <u>Senior Project Proposal</u> (8 hrs. minimum of two months).
- 6. All students are exposed to field trips and studies which are built into eight required four-hour design studios which are taken during each semester of the four final years in the program (LAND 2010, 2020, 3030, 3040, 4050, 4060, 4070/6070, and 4080/6080 or 4150/6150).
- 7. The School also has elective summer field studies or studies abroad in Cortona (Italy), an East Coast Field Trip (2 weeks) and a West Coast Field Trip (2 weeks). LAND 4800/6800.

Because virtually all of the above are requirements for graduation from the program, our compliance monitor will be Professor Scott Weinberg who is our Director of Resident (Undergraduate) Instruction.

College of Family and Consumer Sciences

The faculty and student panel in the College of Family and Consumer Sciences agree that the Cultural Diversity requirement would be met by one of the two assessment techniques listed below:

- 1. Student select and pass coursework from a list of approved classes (see below) that are designated as meeting the Cultural Diversity requirement. The list of designated courses that provide students exposure, appreciation, and sensitivity to multi-cultural issues, customs and events will be compiled from existing courses in each major.
- 2. Students who immerse themselves in another culture while participating in and passing courses in a Study Abroad program would meet the Cultural Diversity requirement by developing an appreciation of the culture and experiencing the culture as an outsider.

Cultural Diversity Requirement

Implementation Plan

Pre-journalism students (freshmen and sophomores) will be encouraged to complete an approved course that will fulfill hours in Area F or elsewhere in the core while they are enrolled in the College of Arts and Sciences. Those who have not done so at the time of admission to this college (juniors) may elect to take one of the options submitted below as part of their major requirements or choose an elective from the University's list of approved courses.

Options

- ADPR 3140 Advertising and Society--Designed to foster a critical understanding of advertising and promotion as an institution, and its role in communication, society, culture, and our economy. Students develop a framework in which to understand the continuing dialogue between supporters and critics, and confront issues related to the institution's ethical conduct, regulatory issues, and social responsibility.
- JRLC 5080 International Mass Communication -- Mass media of the world--what they are like, how they operate, and what impact they have. Philosophies of different systems will be compared, as well as efforts at development or regulation of these systems. Attention will be given to print and electronic media and to international news agencies.
- JRLC 5210 <u>Social Effects of Mass Communication</u> -- Patterns of influence among mass communication and the individuals, organizations, and institutions in society. Current research and critical literature are analyzed in reviewing debates about claims of media effects, including socialization of children, formation of attitudes and values, promotion of social behaviors, and legitimation of power structures.
- JRLC 5400 Race, Gender, and the Media --Relationship between men, women, and racial and ethnic minorities in the United States and the media. Includes discussions of representations in mass media (television, print media, advertising, and film); impact of representations on audiences; inequities in media professions and institutions; and alternative, feminist, and minority media.
- TELE 5440 <u>History and Analysis of Electronic Programming</u>--Radio and television entertainment and informational programs are traced from their roots to the present through socio-cultural, technical, legal, and economic influences.

School of Social Work

Cultural Diversity Requirement

The B.S.W. program has had a cultural diversity requirement in place for about 20 years. The present requirement calls for students to demonstrate the ability to:

- A. Understand intra and intercultural diversity, with particular emphasis on the effects of oppression on African Americans, as evidenced by a grade of B or above in a course which includes substantive multicultural content and is approved by the B.S.W. program.
- B. Understand contemporary issues and concerns about the gendered roles of men and women, as evidenced by a grade of B or above in a course which includes substantive content on gender and is approved by the B.S.W. program.

All students are required to complete a course dealing with intra and inter cultural diversity, and a second course on gendered roles of men and women. Students must earn a "B" or higher grade in both courses to satisfactorily complete this requirement. These courses are selected from the list below.

The B.S.W. program will revisit the cultural diversity requirement by asking the College Social Work Association to conduct a consumer evaluation of this requirement's relevance and effectiveness.
